AIDE MEMOIRE

INTRODUCTION

Given the growing interest and intention in cooperation and collaboration following the lifting of physical mobility restrictions within ASPAC countries, UCLG ASPAC intensively conducts decentralised cooperation and international cooperation amongst cities and local governments and their associations, and within the wider international communities in the region. Furthermore, UCLG ASPAC promotes economic, social, cultural, vocational, and environmental development in enhancing the services to the citizens based on good governance principles which ensure sustainable development.

A range of activities, programmes, and initiatives toward resilient and sustainable cities and local governments are being carried out and implemented by UCLG ASPAC with active engagement and involvement of cities, local governments, and their associations within Asia and the region, and reciprocal cooperation and collaboration with strategic partners and stakeholders, such as:

Localising the SDGs – Localising SDGs is translating the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable
Development into local actions and impacts that contribute to the global achievement of
the SDGs. The 2030 Agenda emphasises the need for an inclusive and localised approach
to the SDGs. It addresses the need to integrate all level of governments and stakeholders
in the elaboration of strategies, the use of transformative means of implementation and
sound methods for monitoring, and reporting.

In terms of monitoring and reporting, local and regional governments are increasingly engaging in the subnational reviews of SDG implementation, also called **Voluntary Local Reviews (VLRs)**. VLR enables a city to present a holistic and coherent portrait of its economic, environmental, and social progress, thereby offering a powerful storytelling tool that connects its local strategy to a global agenda. While the VLRs hold no official status, the process of undertaking these subnational reviews provides multiple benefits to the entities engaging in them, and to SDG implementation at large. These VLRs can also help











reinforce vertical coherence, complement and contribute to the national **Voluntary National Reviews** (VNRs) of SDG implementation.

• Municipalities Network Advocacy on Sanitation in South Asia (MuNASS) - According to the 2019 Asia and the Pacific SDG Progress Report, ESCAP notes that based on the current rate of progress, Asia and the Pacific will likely miss all 17 SDGs by 2030. The region is particularly regressing on the SDG 6 (*Clean Water and Sanitation*) targets, with overall progress on water and sanitation below 2000 levels. Progress on the SDG 6 exhibits significant subregional differences. South and South-West Asia lag behind the regional average, while the Pacific is leading. East and North-East Asia also report significant progress in clean water and sanitation.

With the support of the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation (BMGF), in 2017 UCLG ASPAC initiated enhancing the capacity of Local Government Association in Bangladesh and Nepal for rolling out Institutional and Regulatory Framework (IRF) for Faecal Sludge Management (FSM) under a programme called Municipalities Network Advocacy on Sanitation in South Asia (MuNASS). Under the second phase of the MuNASS programme, UCLG ASPAC plans to leverage its convening power with mayors in the Asia-Pacific region, to expand City Wide Inclusive Sanitation (CWIS), and test innovations on collecting municipal level data to report on the SDG 6.2 *'Safely Managed Sanitation'*. Furthermore, the programme involves the Local Government Associations in 6 member countries of UCLG ASPAC namely Bangladesh, Nepal, Sri Lanka, Cambodia, Vietnam, and Indonesia.

• City Enabling Environment – City Enabling Environment Assessment is an attempt at understanding which "enablers" and "actors" underpin the transformation of the 21st-century cities and thereby attenuate, drive or simply shape the human, social and environmental challenges playing out in cities today. The 'enablers' that the assessment examines are 'core enablers'- policies, law, institutions, systems of governance, fiscal autonomy, and levels of public engagement that hamper or unleash the potential that urbanisation has for sustainable development. It is an assessment of the "de jure" national legislation and policies that allows local governments to benchmark themselves against the minimum standards required for cities and local authorities to contribute significantly to effectively managing urbanisation.

The assessment investigated the institutional environments of the selected countries in an attempt to understand and evaluate how conducive the environment is for the well-











functioning of cities and local governments in addressing these sustainable urban challenges. In addition, the ratings presented were used to analyse countries in the region to identify which countries are currently better positioned to efficiently manage urbanisation and use demographic change to catalyse faster and equitable national growth. The assessment could enable countries to determine areas for institutional reforms, drawing lessons from the better-rated countries, to shape an environment for inclusive and sustainable urban development and inclusive gender-responsive governance.

• Gender Responsive and Participatory Budgeting – At the recent UCLG Congress and the 2022 UCLG ASPAC Council in Daejeon, South Korea, UCLG ASPAC and the Federation Canadian Municipalities (FCM) entered into a partnership to build the gender equality and inclusion capacity within the municipal sector by providing technical assistance, advice, and training, sharing of best practices, and strengthening the effectiveness and impact of the UCLG ASPAC Standing Committee of Women in Local Governments. This partnership will contribute to the Partners for Municipal Innovation-Women in Local Leadership (PMI-WIL) Project's ultimate outcome: enhanced enjoyment of rights for women and girls, in particular those from marginalised groups in ASPAC-selected countries namely Cambodia and Sri Lanka.

Making use of its strategic regional gathering platform, UCLG ASPAC, with the support of the Government of Nepal, Municipal Association of Nepal (MuAN), Kathmandu Metropolitan City, Lalitpur Metropolitan City, and Dhulikhel Municipality, is organising the First Session of the 2023 UCLG ASPAC Executive Bureau Meeting which is bringing together UCLG ASPAC members in the region, experts, partners, and relevant stakeholders, to take part in the side event, plenary session, and parallel sessions that focus on "Inter-Municipal Cooperation for Resilient and Sustainable Cities."

OBJECTIVES

The First Session of the 2023 UCLG ASPAC Executive Bureau aims to provide a regional sharing of information, knowledge, and initiative, and to showcase the exemplary practices on the progress of the implementation of local governance in pursuing the achievement of SDGs 2030 in the Asia-Pacific region.

Specifically, the event aims to (1) share experiences from ASPAC city leaders on the progress of SDGs implementation through the development of VLRs; (2) deliver updated information on city-











wide inclusive sanitation; and (3) provide opportunities for inter-municipal/LGA cooperation and partnership among cities and local governments and their associations.

Side Event : Orientation Workshop on Gender Responsive and Participatory Budgeting

Background

Although women make half of the world's population, representation of women in governance and decision making remains low despite years of dedicated efforts to increase those at global, regional, national, and local levels. Studies have shown that increased women representation in government generally contributes to a stronger focus on women's issues and equality, which are prerequisites for inclusive governance and meaningful democracy.

At the local and grassroots levels, increased participation of women in decision-making and resource allocation processes through mechanisms such as participatory budgeting can lead to more inclusive and responsive public service deliveries. However, due to gender disparities, women often lack access to the important services of waste management, water access, and social services. local governments have the potential to ensure access for women by engaging women in local government and prioritising the needs of women, and involving them in the decision-making processes, such as in planning and budgeting for effective public services delivery. Through women-driven systems and development, local governments can provide inclusive access to social, economic, and infrastructure services, irrespective of citizens' age, sex, and location in society.

Both the 2030 Agenda and the New Urban Agenda call for improved policies and practices for the inclusion of and participation by women in political, economic, and public life. These global agendas represent an unprecedented opportunity to harness the mutually reinforcing goals of women's empowerment and sustainable urban development. There are opportunities for improvement at the local level as more often, compared to the national level, women's representation is slightly improved, mostly due to its proximity to 'home', in addition to the local level seen as an extension of the community. There is a need for awareness and education to inform the public on the processes of local planning and development, as well as build the capacity of local governments for inclusive decision-making.











UCLG ASPAC holds as top priority to improve women's participation and representation in political positions, especially in the local governments. In order to empower women to actively participate in their local government and to represent their local communities, UCLG ASPAC Standing Committee Women in Local Governments (SCWILG) is driving a movement of women empowering and gender equality in the local governments of the Asia-Pacific region through increased awareness of women's equal participation in local governments as well as by introducing best practices and tools to incorporate inclusiveness in policies and schemes. The Committee also advocates for the integration of gender perspectives into different themes of local development, such as local economic development, public space and safety, disaster risk reduction, and education, to name a few, not just to eradicate gender inequality, but also to create a strong foundation for women to fully develop their potentials as a leader.

Background

The urbanisation process in the Asia-Pacific region is proceeding at unprecedented speed and scale. Rapid urbanisation linked to economic growth brings new opportunities and challenges for sustainable and inclusive development. The pace of urban growth has caught many governments and communities in the region unprepared. Some results of increased urbanisation include the spread of informal settlements onto unsafe, hazard-prone or unsuitable land and the physical expansion of cities. The conversion of quality agricultural land into urban settlements, the growth of mega-cities, the large proportion of people who live in informal settlements, poor quality housing, and large increases in property values in some areas are poorly managed.

Over 40 percent of the Asian-Pacific population which lives in cities contributes 80 percent of the region's gross domestic product (GDP). Urbanisation enhances productivity, increases gross domestic product per head, and has turned into a major source of economic strength. However, economic growth has not benefited all urban dwellers in the region equally.

What is CWIS

Asia's cities are growing rapidly. By 2030, more than 55% of the population will live in urban areas. With higher population densities and urban expansion, managing the vast amounts of human waste is becoming ever more challenging. Lack of proper sanitation systems can significantly impact the city and national economies, affecting public health, productivity, competitiveness, real estate values, and the overall quality of life.

Most investment has been for centralised wastewater treatment and sewerage. Still, such conventional sewer networks often do not serve newer or informal settlements. For developing or mid-income countries - extending such sewer systems to low-income and informal settlements can be challenging and costly. Poverty targeting is still weak. Poor people and most people living in informal settlements use on-site sanitation services. They are often













poorly built and managed, and have separate and weaker supporting institutions. In the most impoverished areas, there continues to be no sanitation infrastructure at all.

There has been limited involvement of the small-scale private sector, the primary service provider in low-income and non-sewered areas. The City-Wide Inclusive Sanitation (CWIS) is an evolving concept to meet the sanitation challenges in the world's growing urban areas more effectively focusing on SDG 6.2. It builds on current sanitation technologies and practices to achieve more comprehensive, effective, and sustainable sanitation services. The outcome of a CWIS approach is that everyone in an urban area has access to and benefits from adequate and sustainable sanitation services. And all human waste is managed safely along the whole sanitation service chain. CWIS comprises four elements—capable institutions, safety and reliability, equity and inclusion, and sustainability—with associated actions to achieve the desired outcome.

MuNASS Regional Sharing on CWIS

UCLG ASPAC is working with the local governments and their associations across Asia and the Pacific to map the conditions, so that the programme can accommodate the needs and concern of local governments at the national level. And the UCLG ASPAC knowledge platform planned can be used as the platform for advocacy and reduction of gap between national policy and local implementation. Hence, UCLG ASPAC has planned to organise a regional sharing event on CWIS along with the Executive Bureau Meeting in Nepal with the presence of leaders from South and South East Asia, and Asia-Pacific region.

Objectives

The objective of the Citywide Inclusive Sanitation (CWIS) technical session is to generate commitment through sharing experiences from city leaders regarding an essential update to address CWIS principles in city sanitation planning to Asia-Pacific cities and local governments.

Background

Climate change is the most significant threat to life on Earth and a global phenomenon that hugely impacts urban life. Climate change is mainly driven by Greenhouse Gases (GHG) and rising global temperatures, which cause rising sea levels, increase the number of extreme weather events such as floods, droughts, and storms, and increase the spread of tropical diseases. In addition, global warming is making cities warmer, while urbanisation intensifies this process by generating urban heat islands and the imposition of aerosol radiation. The consequences of climate change, the urban heat island effect, and air pollution are expected to increase the risk of poor human health in cities globally by the mid-twenty-first century.

Addressing the problem of climate change requires collaboration from all parties. Not only does the national government handle the problem of climate change, but the local government also has a crucial role to play. Many efforts can be made in urban governance, such as open green spaces, green buildings, and managing environmentally friendly public transportation. A comprehensive and measurable effort is needed to achieve an urban environment resilient to climate change.

The Asia-Pacific region is home to 60 percent of the world's population – some 4.3 billion people – and includes the world's most populous countries, China and India. There are severe challenges facing the urban environment, governance, financing, and planning systems. Climate change problems are the most existential. More specifically, air pollution can be enumerated. Ambient air pollution kills about 3 million people annually and affects all regions of the world, although Western Pacific and South East Asia are the most affected ones. Cities across the Asia Pacific must adopt and implement sustainable urban development policies and actions to mitigate and adapt to the impact of climate change.

UCLG ASPAC has been conducting a range of activities, programmes, and initiatives toward resilient and sustainable cities and local governments within the region, including the City











Enabling Environment (CEE) Assessment. The CEE Assessment attempts to understand which "enablers" and "actors" underpin the transformation of 21st-century cities and thereby attenuate, drive, or simply shape the human, social and environmental challenges playing out in cities today. The 'enablers' that the assessment examines are 'core enablers'- policies, law, institutions, systems of governance, fiscal autonomy, and levels of public engagement that hamper or unleash the potential that urbanisation has for the sustainable development. It is an assessment of the "de jure" national legislation and policies that allow local governments to benchmark themselves against the minimum standards required for cities and local authorities to contribute significantly to effectively managing urbanisation.

Objectives

The City Enabling Environment Session aims to:

- Share experiences from UCLG ASPAC and UCLG AFRICA CEE Rating Result.
- Deliver updated information regarding the newest CEE Rating in Asia and the Pacific for 2023 and the newest CEE Rating Indicator number 11 on Environment and Climate Governance.
